

Brain Size Increases Early in Autism

The early brain overgrowth characteristic of children with autism occurs before the age of 2, a longitudinal MRI study confirmed. A previous study determined that the brains of 2-year-old children with autism were as much as 10% larger than unaffected children, according to Heather Cody Hazlett, PhD, of the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill, and colleagues. Those same children have now been re-evaluated at ages 4 to 5, and while the autistic children's brains remained enlarged, no further excess growth had occurred, Hazlett's group reported in the May Archives of General Psychiatry.

Autism Tests for Preemies May Be Faulty, Study Sugge

It may be better to wait until baby turns 30 months old, researchers say

Doctors are erroneously diagnosing autism spectrum disorder in many 18-month-old toddlers who were born extremely premature, a small new study suggests.

Later testing showed that a high proportion of the toddlers diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder at that age were not autistic, the researchers found. Instead, the youngsters simply had a cognitive or language delay, both of which are common in children who were preterm babies, the researchers said.

Autism Checklist Offers Early Diagnosis

According to latest reports, one in 100 children in USA suffer from some form of autism. Already, children aged 18 to 24 months have been recommended to be screened for autism during regular doctor visits, by the American Academy of Paediatrics. In 2009, studies discovered most children were almost five years old, before being diagnosed.

The current study using a 24 question checklist parents can answer in five minutes, reveals signs of autism can be detected in children as young as one, has been funded by the National Institutes of Health.

Autism And Epilepsy Caused By Common Gene

<u>Autism</u> and epilepsy predisposition is connected to a new gene that researchers in Canada say they discovered. Many with autism also have treatment-resistant epilepsy

Many people with autism also have epilepsy that doesn't respond to treatment, a new study suggests. Researchers looked at the medical records of 127 children and adults aged 3 to 49 with autism who had had one or more seizures. The patients had been referred to the NYU Comprehensive Epilepsy Center in <u>New York City</u> over a 20-year period because they had also been diagnosed with epilepsy or it was suspected they might have epilepsy, said study lead author Dr. Orrin Devinsky.

New study sheds light on sleep problems in children with autism

The current prevalence of <u>autism</u> spectrum disorder is alarmingly high. Although there is no cure for <u>autism</u>, it is possible to manage and treat the comorbid medical conditions associated with <u>autism</u>.

One of these conditions, sleeping disturbance, can be challenging to treat. B-W School District Leaders "Disappointed" Over Pittsburgh Business <u>Times Rankings; Raising Taxes Not Their Solution</u>

"At one point, we had a great number of our most specially needed students out (of regular district schools). We brought them back in. And we brought them back in about the time when our scores began to decline." According to the Pennsylvania Department of Education, 129 and 157 special-needs students took the PSSA exams in math and reading, respectively, for Baldwin-Whitehall in 2009-10 (6.3 and 7.6 percent of the total B-W test-takers in those categories), and 69 took both the science and writing exams that year (7.5 and 7.4 percent, respectively).

The PA Department of Education identifies special-needs students as IEP students, or those having individualized education programs.

Early detection of disabilities in children pays off

Children assessed at the earliest possible stage - and those who receive early intervention services - are less likely to develop a second disability. In addition, they are more likely to have a higher quality of life with sustainable improvement of communication skills.

Early intervention can also have a significant financial return on investment. By providing treatment and teaching coping skills earlier, children are able to become more self-reliant more quickly. In the long run, early intervention can save families and communities <u>as much as \$17 dollars</u> for every \$1 invested in treatment.

Acceptance grows for autistic kids in church

"The church has a wonderful theology and heart. ... We don't always live it out well," said Anne Masters, the director of pastoral ministry with persons with disabilities for the Archdiocese of Newark. Masters oversees a program designed to welcome Catholics with disabilities. Her "Attends Mass" program includes training for religious educators and support groups for parents. Hope builds for treating intellectual disabilities

A common medication is one of several drugs that might correct or even reverse the effects of fragile X, autism and other developmental disorders. This year, he can sit in a classroom for half an hour before needing a "sensory break": a walk around the parking lot to clear his overstimulated <u>brain</u>. He is reading at a fourth-grade level, following class discussions, looking teachers squarely in the eyes and answering questions. It includes 10 management sessions and an optional 24 week follow-up involves monthly visits to our outpatient clinic. This is open to children 5-13 years of age who are not on medication or are on medications that are not working well.

Theiss Early Autism Program of Western Psychiatric Institute and Clinic (WPIC) Open Enrollment for Spring 2011

The Theiss Early Autism Program (TEAP) provides care for 6 children ages 2-5 years of age. The children follow an individualized program and receive one-on-one instruction through Applied Behavior Analysis, including Discrete Trial Teaching, Applied Verbal Behavior, and Natural Environment Teaching. Each individualized treatment program is designed to address a child's cognitive and language skills, self-care and adaptive behavior, and social-emotional development. Daily activities also include circle time, gross motor, playground activities, pretend play, early language arts, art and sensory activities, early cooperative play in small groups, self-help activities, meal time (lunch and snack), and socialization activities (play opportunities with typically developing children from an adjacent child care facility twice a week). The program is located at the Hill House Association, 1835 Centre Avenue, WPIC Autism Suite 200, Pittsburgh, PA 15219. Hours are 8:30 am to 2:30 pm. The program runs for 12 months a year, Monday through Friday. Although transportation is not available, families can enrolled in MATP (Medical Assistance Transportation Program) for reimbursement for travel. 
