MESSAGE FROM THE ABOARD OFFICE

ABOARD's policy is to inform. We trust that individuals will assimilate the information we provide and make the best decision for their children and clients. Right now ABOARD sees as an important part of our mission to keep you informed on the proposed budget that affect the autism community and PA families.

ABOARD has been taking many calls from concerned parents, caregivers, professionals and providers. We have all tried to be patient while awaiting the governor's proposal this week, then pored over line items along with others who worried about potential cuts. While waiting, ABOARD met with with our local legislators to talk things over and share the concerns that our family and friends had. Those were enlightening meetings for both sides and, not surprisingly, we met staffers who had relatives with autism. We talked with elected officials about the incidence of autism, effects on families, concerns across the lifespan, and ABOARD's mission.

So far, in the proposed budget, there were little to no cuts made to autism services. This, however, is not a final document. The budget will be debated and should be finished by late June this year.

You may or may not have specific budget concerns that impact different parts of your life. Overall the best approach to the various unknowns is to simply take part in our democracy. Learn what budget cuts are being considered, and if you feel this affects you, let your voice be heard. A simple way to do that is to make an appointment to talk in person and express your individual or family concerns to your senators and representatives. You may enlighten your elected officials with your story. He or she may teach you something new about the budget process. And you never know what seeds you may sow to benefit the entire autism community in the process.

ABOARD will provide the most current autism information and supports - maintaining business as usual - while we watch the rest of the budget process unfold. As we learn of any hearings or events related to Pennsylvania autism services, we will pass that information along to you. And we look forward to hearing about your experiences as you talk things over in your local government offices. Together we will continue to maximize possibilities for people with autism in Pennsylvania.

Freedom to choose leisure activities benefits people with autism

Autistic adults making choices beneficial

Giving people with autism the power to choose their own leisure activities can boost their enjoyment, communication and social skills, a U.S. researcher says.

John Dattilo, a professor of recreation, park and tourism management at Pennsylvania State University, and colleagues said the study involved a group of 20 autistic adults who participated in a year-long recreation program that offered them a chance to choose their own activities and 20 other autistic adults randomly assigned to the program's waiting list.

Caregiver in death sent to prison

Stacey Strauss, a former caregiver who fatally forgot a helpless autistic man inside a hot van last summer, was sent to state prison Monday by a Bucks County judge clearly miffed at her lack of repentance. "Frankly, Ms. Strauss, I don't believe I've heard . . . a less remorseful statement from someone about to be sentenced," Judge Albert J. Cepparulo told her.

While on duty that day, records show, Strauss placed or received 34 cell-phone calls and 71 text messages. The calls alone ate up more than three hours of her eight-hour shift. The longest call, lasting 44 minutes, occurred during the critical first hour that Bryan Nevins, 20, sat helpless in the van Strauss had parked after returning to Woods from a field trip. http://articles.philly.com

Education Legislation

Pa. legislator looks to make bullying a crime

A Pennsylvania representative has introduced legislation that would make bullying a criminal offense and set penalties for violators. State Rep. Mike O'Brien, D-Philadelphia, said his bill would define bullying as the intent to harass, annoy, alarm or intimidate another individual or group of individuals; or place another individual or group of individuals in fear of personal injury or property damage. "Detention, in-school suspension or expulsion will only go so far," O'Brien said in a statement. "A criminal record, or the thought of having one, can and will deter some young people, and even adults, from bullying. And if it doesn't, bullies will finally be made to pay. It's time for bullying to be treated like the crime that it is."

Cosponsors Needed for Burden of Proof Legislation

School Districts Hold Unfair Advantage Over Parents in Special Education Disputes

Before a recent U.S Supreme Court decision (Schaffer vs. Weast), the practice in Pennsylvania was for school districts to assume the burden of proof whenever disputes arose between them and parents regarding a child's special education program. However, the Supreme Court decision ruled that, unless state rules indicate otherwise, the party "seeking relief" has the burden of proof in IDEA due process proceedings. Pennsylvania has no statute or regulation that assigns the burden of proof to school districts. The Court acknowledged that school districts have a natural advantage over parents in such disputes, particularly when it comes to resources. Few parents go into this process with the resources or knowledge to properly present their child's case against seasoned professionals and bureaucrats representing school districts.

Legislation has been introduced by Senator Patrick Browne to assign the burden of proof onto school districts. (Senate Bill 627) Cosponsors are needed. Please contact your state senator and ask that he/she become a cosponsor of SB627.

Scientists Link 'Sets' of Genetic Abnormalities to Autisi

DNA analysis of more than 1,000 kids may one day lead to better treatments, researchers say While the genetic underpinnings of autism are enormously complex, new DNA research is honing in on sets of abnormal genes that may play a role in the disorder.

Researchers from the Center for Biomedical Informatics at The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia (CHOP) said that, while other scientists have theorized about a connection between gene mutations, impaired brain development, and the onset of autism, their work is the first to establish the link.




