## New Research Finds Half of All Children With Autism Wander From Safety

Almost one year after National Autism Association urged the Interagency Autism Coordinating Committee (IACC) to address the absence of critical research on autism-related wandering incidents and fatalities, the Interactive Autism Network (IAN), the nation's largest online autism research project, revealed the preliminary results of the first major survey on wandering and elopement among individuals with autism spectrum disorders (ASD).

The wandering and elopement survey found that approximately half of parents of children with autism report that their child elopes, with the behavior peaking at age four. Among these families, nearly 50% say that their child went missing long enough to cause significant concern about safety.

This survey is the first research effort to scientifically validate that elopement is a critical safety issue for the autism community," said Dr. Paul Law, Director of the IAN Project at the Kennedy Krieger Institute in Baltimore, Maryland. "We hope that advocates and policy makers use this research to implement key safety measures to

support these families and keep these children safe. In just three weeks, more than 800 parents of children with autism completed the survey. The findings highlighted below summarize the compelling results and crucial safety concerns identified by parents:

#### **Dangers of Elopement**

The tendency of individuals with ASD to wander or "bolt" puts them at risk of trauma, injury or even death:

- More than one third of children who elope are never or rarely able to communicate their name, address, or phone number verbally or by writing/typing
- Two in three parents report their missing children had a "close call" with a traffic injury
- 32% of parents report a "close call" with a possible drowning

#### **Effect of Wandering on Families**

- Wandering was ranked among the most stressful ASD behaviors by 58% of parents of elopers
- 62% of families with children who elope were prevented from attending/enjoying activities outside the home due to fear of wandering
- 40% of parents had suffered sleep disruption due to fear of elopement
- Children with ASD are eight times more likely to elope between the ages of seven and 10 than their typically-developing siblings

#### **Resources, Support for Families**

- Half of families with elopers report they had never received advice or guidance about elopement from a professional
- Only 19% had received such support from a psychologist or mental health professional
- Only 14% had received guidance from their pediatrician or another physician **Motivations for Elopement**

Despite speculation that summer is the peak season for elopement, 67% of parents of elopers said they saw no seasonal pattern at all; only 25% felt summer was the peak season. The top five reasons parents believed their children eloped included:

- Enjoys exploring (54%)
- Heads for a favorite place (36%)
- Escapes demands/anxieties (33%)
- Pursues special topic (31%)
- Escapes sensory discomfort (27%)

### National Autism Association Announces the Launch of Its "Big Red Safety Box" Program to Combat Wandering

In an ongoing effort to combat the rise in wandering-related tragedies and deaths within the Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) community, the National Autism Association (NAA) announced today its launch of the "Big Red Safety Box Program" made possible by a generous grant from the American Legion Child Welfare Foundation. The safety box is designed to provide caregivers wandering-prevention educational materials and tools. Wandering, elopement, "running" or fleeing incidents within the autism community have led to a rise in fatalities among those with ASD.

The Safety Box will include educational materials, door alarms, a waterproof ID, and visual prompts to deter children and adults from exiting their homes or classrooms. Regardless of any tools caregivers may have in place, NAA says it's critical that caregivers maintain close supervision and security in all settings. "Wandering prevention takes a multi-faceted approach, and because different types of wandering exist, there is no one answer in solving this issue," added Fournier.

#### Work of UC Davis autism researchers to be featured on PBS series

Like other researchers at the <u>UC Davis MIND Institute</u>, epidemiologist Irva Hertz-Picciotto is determined to reduce the prevalence of autism.

She and others at the <u>MIND Institute</u> - the acronym stands for <u>Medical Investigation</u> of Neurodevelopmental Disorders - dedicate their careers to understanding Autism Spectrum Disorder, a group of developmental disabilities that's diagnosed in an average of 1 in 110 children, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

#### Refractory Seizures Common in Autism

Among 127 patients with autism who had experienced at least one seizure, the epilepsy was treatment resistant in 33.9%, according to Orrin Devinsky, MD, and colleagues from New York University in New York City. Seizure onset was earlier, at an average age of 5.9 years, among patients with treatment-resistant epilepsy compared with patients who had been seizure-free for at least one year and whose average age of onset was at 10.9 years (P=0.008), the researchers reported online in Epilepsia.

#### Drexel's Fry plans campus overhaul, new autism center

Like Fry, Newschaffer said Drexel's focus on public health would make it different from any other autism research center. That means in part focusing on ways to identify autism early to increase the chance that a child gets treatment as quickly as possible, he said. It also means studying which interventions work, and seeking ways to make them more widely available. For example, if an intervention works in a controlled university setting, Drexel's center might look for ways to train parents to do it in their own homes. "The goal is to translate some of the leaps of knowledge that I think are going to be happening in the next few years," Newschaffer said. Fry said the lack of understanding about autism drove the decision to create the new institute, but he also had a personal motive. He has an autistic nephew. "This is not just in my head but in my heart," Fry said.

"Autistic kids are very tactile, so they like touching things and feeling different sensations," said Neal. "They like the pads they get to hit, they like how they're soft."

Autism effects each person differently, as Neely says their minds are wired in a different way. Another child in the class, 6-year-old Laithan Pratt, is high functioning. His father has noticed improvements in his behavior since joining the class in December.

"It's taught him, it's actually built on what he's learning at school - the paying attention, the listening to directions - big one," said Grant Pratt, Laithan's dad. "And, that's really what we've seen the most improvement in."

## AERI BHS'S FAMILY BASED MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES PROGRAM AND FAMILY BEHAVIORAL RESOURCES TO PRESENT FREE EDUCATIONAL SEMINARS FOR THE COMMUNITY

April 15, 2011 - AERI Behavioral Health Services (AERI BHS) and Family Behavioral Resources (FBR) are teaming up to present three free educational seminars as part of its new COPE (Community Outreach Preservation and Education) Series for the community: "How Does Depression Affect the Family?"; "Trauma, Grief and Loss"; and "Dealing with ADHD."

Susan L. Roop, MA, NCC, LPC is the Director of Family Based Mental Health Services at AERI BHS who is partnering with Shannon Adkins, MSCP, Clinical Director of Behavioral Health Rehabilitation Services at FBR to write and present the series.

The opening topic, being presented April 27 at the AERI BHS/FBR Hermitage site on North Buhl Farm Drive, is especially relevant to today's families. Ms. Roop and Ms. Adkins agree that symptoms of depression in children are often masked by agitation and irritability. "Often it is easy for parents to mistake depression for something else," says Ms. Adkins.

The team will share risk factors, the effects of depression, coping skills, and available resources in the community to help families. Roop and Adkins agree that families are often tempted to ignore mood changes in children. "Moodiness is often seen as a normal part of growing up, but the reality is that ignoring the signs and symptoms of depression can have severe negative consequences for children and families," Roop states.

Over a year ago, the Keeping All Students Safe Act passed in the House of Representatives with bipartisan support. Later in 2010, it failed to reach the Senate floor for a vote. With the support of the National Autism Association, the Alliance to Prevent Restraint, Aversive Interventions and Seclusion (APRAIS), and advocates like you, this critical legislation has now been re-introduced into the House of Representatives by Rep. George Miller, D-Calif.

The Keeping All Students Safe Act would, for the first time, put in place minimum safety standards to prevent abusive restraint and seclusion in schools across the country, similar to protections already in place in medical and community based facilities.
