

Why can't I make friends? SLU assists teens with Asperger's

Looking for help led Joe as far as the UCLA Program for the Education and Enrichment of Relational Skills, a 14-week friendship boot camp for teens with higher-functioning autism disorders. Joe was ready to stay with a relative in Los Angeles, but facilitators said it would be better to find something close to home. Important relationships often continued among participants.

Joe heard SLU might offer a similar program. He reached out to Eichler, wondering if she could help.

Eichler didn't tell him the university only has a social skills intervention for children, not for teens. She didn't tell him she couldn't find anything he was looking for. She couldn't just turn him away.

"We were really touched by his story," Eichler said. "When a teen comes forth and says he's having difficulty, and I need help with this. It was hard to refuse."

She sent emails to gauge interest and got more than 100 responses from parents eager to find

resources for their teens.

She interviewed Joe, asking him how often he left his house and about his grades, his friends and his struggles. Eichler worked with a graduate student to create a six-week program - Teen Connection - using Joe's answers as guidance.

"We were able to organize a program really based on what he was telling us he needed," she said.

Teen Connection started last summer with just six participants and a handful of undergraduate volunteers. The fall session grew to 10 teens, and the spring session had 17 with as many as 30 volunteers involved. Joe attended all three.

Scientists warn of chemical-autism link

Autism and environmental health experts called for greater scrutiny of chemicals found in the environment, which could potentially lead to autism and other neurodevelopmental disorders, in a conference call Tuesday. "We live, breathe and start our families in the presence of toxic chemical mixtures and constant low-level toxic exposures, in stark contrast to the way chemicals are tested for safety," said Donna Ferullo, Director of Program Research at The Autism Society.

Autism linked to hundreds of genetic mutations

Three new studies conclude that autism disorders are genetically very complex, not caused by one or two gene defects. The potential changes in DNA may produce what are essentially different forms of autism. Autism is not caused by one or two gene defects but probably by hundreds of different mutations, many of which arise spontaneously, according to research that examined the genetic underpinnings of the disorder in more than 1,000 families. The findings, reported in three studies published Wednesday in the journal Neuron, cast autism disorders as genetically very complex, involving many potential changes in DNA that may produce, essentially, different forms of autism.

Autism and Eating Disorders: A Problematic Connection

For example, both anorexics and individuals with autism exhibit obsessive/compulsive behavior and rigid thinking. Tic disorders are fairly common among individuals in both populations and both have trouble dealing with change. Additionally, researchers found that some 20 percent of anorexic patients unknowingly suffered from Asperger's Syndrome. Dr. Tony Atwood, autism and AS expert, reports that early ritualistic behavior around food can be the precursor to eating disorders. Problematically, some girls with Asperger's begin to treat their weight as their special interest, becoming obsessed by the science of calories as they pore over charts and tables.

New Therapies Hold Promise As Autism Treatments

Two promising new treatments to aid people with autism have shown effectiveness in pilot studies conducted by an Arizona State University professor and private researchers. Several studies indicate that children with autism often have abnormalities in critical biochemical functions that help maintain health - specifically methylation, glutathione, and mitochondrial functions.

Looking For Early Signs Of Autism In Brain Waves

A technology that monitors electrical activity in the brain could help identify infants who will go on to develop autism, scientists say. The technology, known as electroencephalography, or EEG, is also providing hints about precisely how autism affects the brain and which therapies are likely to help children with autism spectrum disorders. "Right now, the earliest we can reliably identify a child is, say, 3 years of age," says Charles Nelson, a professor of pediatrics and neuroscience at Children's Hospital Boston and Harvard Medical School. "Our work is designed to see [if we] can we do that in early infancy, long before any signs or symptoms of autism are apparent in the child's behavior." If EEG lives up to its early promise, Nelson says, children with autism might start getting therapy before their first birthday.

The experience of belonging. So simple but incredibly important. Twelve years ago when my son was diagnosed, he did not speak. He could be aggressive and had many severe behaviors. His loss of eye contact and focus made it difficult for him to learn picture communication, so we moved to sign language. I remember clearly his first sign was for "more". So basic...the need to be able to ask for "more water" or "more food". But it was communication. By the time he was 4 years old, he was able to speak in 4 word sentences. While I may not have appreciated the progress at the time, it gave us something to hold onto to...it gave us hope.

BHRS, also referred to as "wraparound," is a community based service that offers therapeutic interventions to children and adolescents with serious emotional disturbances and/or behavioral problems. The services include Therapeutic Staff Support (TSS), Mobile Therapy (MT), and Behavior Specialist Consultant (BSC). The discussion will be lead by Community Behavioral Health's Medical and Clinical staff members. Dr. Paula Humphries, Director of Psychology will be joined by Maria Dobinick, Care Manager and Corinne Thornton, Supervisor on the BHRS Team. They will discuss and answer questions on how BHRS can address the challenges related to an autism diagnosis.

About the Panel Participants:

Dr. Paula Humphries is currently Director of Psychology at CBH and Director of the Behavioral Health Forensic Evaluation Center at Family Court. She has served as Director for the American Psychological Association Internship Program. Her experience includes Director of Inpatient Behavioral Health Services, private practice doing evaluations in charter schools, Director of a children's inpatient unit and Director of outpatient adult, child and adolescent clinics. Dr. Humphries received her doctorate from Hahnemann University and School Psychology training at Bryn Mawr College.
