She went on to serve as a teacher, supervisor, grant-writer, and national trainer for this innovative school.

For the past 15 years Bonnie has been an education consultant with The Watson Institute in Sewickley, PA. She also consults in 32 autistic support classrooms in the Pittsburgh Public Schools, as well as numerous other districts throughout the region.

"Bonnie has a passion for finding new and better ways to educate children with autism," said Luciana Randall, Executive Director of ABOARD. "In addition to assisting the children she supports directly, she has developed extensive materials, videos, outcomes measurements and other tools so that all parents and professionals can improve the education of the individuals they support.
